SAY – TELL – TALK – SPEAK Explanation and Examples

TELL

Using SAY, TELL, SPEAK and TALK can be very confusing. Sometimes they are similar and sometimes they are very different! Here are the main differences, plus some practice exercises:

MEANING: To speak specific words SAY HOW IT'S FORMED: SAY + SOMETHING (+ to SOMEONE) SAY usually includes the words that were said, either as reported speech or as a quotation SAY with reported (indirect) speech: SAY with quoted (direct) speech: He's saying hello. He said, "Hello, neighbor!" He said hello to his new neighbor. She'll say, "Let's have lunch." She's saying that she wants to have lunch together. "Let's have lunch," she said to us. She said him about her vacation plans. Avoid this SAY cannot take an indirect object. Try TELL or ASK instead: common mistake: She told him about her vacation plans.

MEANING: To give specific information to someone

HOW IT'S FORMED: TELL + <u>SOMEONE</u> (+ (about) <u>SOMETHING</u> / to <u>VERB</u>)

TELL almost always includes name(s) of the receiver(s) of the information

TELL with reported (indirect) speech:		TELL with quoted (direct) speech:	
I'm telling him about my project.I'll tell him to help with my project.		"I have a big new project," I told him.	
She told the truth about her mistake.She told us that she made a mistake.		She'll simply tell them, "I made a mistake."	
Avoid this common mistake:	 He told that he wants to open a coffee shop. TELL almost always has an indirect object. Try SAY instead: He said that he wants to open a coffee shop. 		

TALK	MEANING: To say things in a general and less formal sense HOW IT'S FORMED: TALK (+ to/with <u>SOMEONE</u>) (+ about <u>SOMETH</u>			
TALK and SPEAK do <u>not</u> use quoted (direct) speech – they don't give us specific words
